### Muntjac deer

If you've noticed that some of the new shrubs look like they've been eaten, well they have been!

Muntjac deer visit the site, probably at night. They are quite small, only about 45-52 cm tall to the shoulder. And they are quite shy.

They have been eating some of our shrubs. We know it is deer because volunteers have seen the hoof prints close to the plants.

There are no photos of them on the site but some of the trustees have seen them along Dollis Brook by Finchley Lawn Tennis Club and on Totteridge Common.

Muntjac deer were introduced from China in the 20<sup>th</sup> century and are now endemic in southeast England.

### Moss Hall Nursery

As regular readers will know, Moss Hall Nursery brings some of their charges most days to the site.

They have a rule:

*'No picking and no licking.'*

Something we should all stick to.

This will maintain the flora and fauna of the area and ensure we don't eat anything harmful as some plants are poisonous.

### Fernery

The ferns that were transplanted from a volunteer's garden a few months ago weren't doing very well. To try to protect them, volunteers used some of the bricks found on the site to create a circle round the ferns and now they're doing really well. There are more to be transplanted to build-up the area.

### Water

A local geographer who has lived in the area since the 1940s told us that Nether Street used to flood at the dip around where Chilvins Court is today.

This is because a stream runs down the hill from Ballards Lane to Dollis Brook. It was culverted so that the stream now runs underground and Nether Street no longer floods.

The well taps into this now underground water source which provides us with plenty of water. It smells of sulphur but the plants don't mind. Thanks to everyone who helped us access the water.

### Fencing

The fence round the site is being replaced and should be finished by the end of the month.

### Upkeep

Now that the weather has been warmer and it has rained a bit, the Orchard has become very green.

Volunteers have been doing a lot of weeding to keep the newly planted trees, shrubs and whips in good condition and reduce the competition for water and other nutrients. They need space to grow.

Because May was very dry, volunteers have also been doing a lot of watering. Being able to access the well has been a great help.

### Duke of Edinburgh Award

We have had a few young people volunteering for their Duke of Edinburgh Award.

If you know someone who is going to be doing the DofE Award, let them know about our volunteering opportunities.

### Work Sessions - come along and join-in

If you were put off by the heavy digging that was needed in the past, please come along and try again.

The site has now got to the stage where it's more general maintenance.

The sessions are now weeding and watering to maintain the site and more planting will be done in September/October this year.

Volunteers have worked hard to clear the Orchard to enable planting.
